Every day the men and women of EMS put their lives on the line to save the lives of others. Tragically, every year some of these heroes die in the line of duty. Unfortunately exact numbers are not available due to the lack of injury and death tracking. Since 2001, EMS providers from around the nation have honored these men and women in a memorial bike tour leading to site of a yearly EMS memorial. The **2008 EMS Memorial Bike Ride** is being held **May 17-24, 2008**. This ride will start in New York City and end 600+ miles away in Roanoke, Virginia, site of this year's EMS Memorial ceremony. The event focuses attention on the accomplishments of all EMS personnel, and educates the community at large about the need for improved safety standards, injury prevention, disability tracking and death benefits for EMS personnel and their families.

Members of the EHS student association at Inver Hills Community College are assembling a Minnesota group to participate in the ride. The students will be providing logistic and medical support to **over 200 bicyclists** and some will also be biking the 600 mile trek.
